Numbers On The Rise

More than <u>210,000</u> migrants have arrived in New York City since the spring of 2022.



Massive Costs

New York State has committed \$4.3 billion through State Fiscal Year 2026 to reimburse NYC for migrant services.



Failure to Act

Since 2016, Federal Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) has issued <u>over 10,000</u> detainer requests with zero being honored due to NYC's sanctuary city policies.

Our Plan

Protect Taxpayer Money

- Require the Comptroller to audit funds for aid to migrants in New York State.
- Prevent funding from being used to shelter migrants in schools, daycare centers, or community-based organizations.

Ensure Community Protections

- Require New York State to register all migrants in order to assist with background checks and to monitor those seeking asylum.
- Require local governments to "opt-in" before accepting migrants from other jurisdictions.
- Require voter ID when casting a ballot.

State-Federal Partnership

- Require the State to notify ICE upon the arrest or conviction of a non-citizen.
- Ensure necessary State agency and law enforcement assistance during Federal Immigration Enforcement.
- Punish drug dealers for selling drugs leading to death, similar to federal law.
